



### 2. Classification of Reports


**Graph 2.1: Classification of STRs received by Agency Business Type (Sectors)** 



The chart above shows that the total number of STRs received during the period under review decreased to 70 STRs when compared to 93 STRs recorded in March 2023. Further, from all the STRs received in the period under review, only 4 reports were classified as 'high priority' while 57 STRs were still under cleansing at the time of reporting. The banking sector continues to file the most STRs nationally.




In the period under review, Bank-C filed the majority of STRs (33 STRs).








